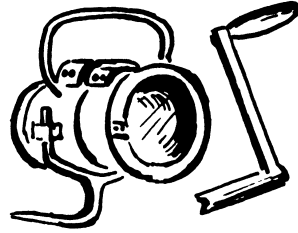
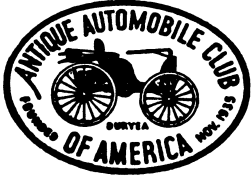

#### **REPORT ON THE 2022 NAT'L MEETING**

As some of you may already know, I had the privilege of attending the 2022 AACA Convention in Gettysburg. Gettysburg? Yes, and based on my experiences planning and running major events, I can only imagine the logistical challenges the AACA Headquarters staff had to address due to the last minute change of venue. The good news is the AACA staff did a masterful job, coordinating with both hotels to accommodate speakers and exhibitors. The bad news? My understanding is some fellow members were burdened with last minute travel issues such as already-booked flights to Philadelphia, travel from Philadelphia to Gettysburg, hotel reservations/cancellations, etc. Please note the change of venue was not made on a whim; ongoing COVID policies in Philadelphia forced the issue.

Several hundred members were in attendance, and there was quite the buzz about the new convention location. Based on my observations, I believe the stage has been set to take the convention out of Philadelphia. There were many favorable conversations about the affordability of Gettysburg, especially regarding food and parking. There were also countless conversations about exploring other locations, ranging from the Philadelphia suburban areas (King of Prussia, for ex.) to the mid or south Atlantic regions, to even central or western United States locations. This was a hot topic at the general meeting as well.

The seminars I attended had large audiences and, based on my observations as we all "changed classes", the other seminars seemed to be well-attended. One takeaway from the seminars was there seemed to be a very positive, enthusiastic vibe in the air, a welcome contrast the ordeal we have all been enduring the past two years.



Being a novice AACA judge, I felt it best to attend the judging related seminars. The presenters were well prepared, and the attendance numbers were high. After attending the DPC and HPOF seminars, in addition to Judging School, I feel even better prepared to judge the national events on my calendar this year.

With regard to the DPC (Driver Participation Class), the constant refinement of this newer class should prove effective at better qualifying and certifying entrants. There was also some discussion at the General Meeting about renaming the class to eliminate the stigma sometimes associated with "participation trophies".

Of course, the convention wasn't all business. One couldn't walk down a hallway between seminars without hearing someone talking about the pinewood derby; you could swear the Indy 500 had come into town. And the pinewood derby didn't disappoint. There was a variety of cars, ranging from artistic, to vintage, to purpose built vehicles meeting, just meeting, the rules. Competition was stiff, with races won by the slimmest (hundredths of a second) margins.

The general meeting was time well spent. Awards were presented, there were touching send-offs for retiring Board members, the new Board was introduced. One of most memorable moments was acknowledging and recognizing AACA CEO Steve Moskowitz for the remarkable job he has done, and is doing, especially with regard to the many challenges of the past few years. The standing ovation he received was well-deserved.

Of course, it was also time for AACA President Jim Elliot to hand the reigns over to one of our own, Mr. Wayne Tuck. Based on the content of both Jim's and Wayne's messages, it is my opinion AACA is the best of hands, and will continue to thrive. A common theme in both their messages was a genuine interest in hearing from the membership, strongly encouraging members to share their ideas to help our organization.

The questions and answers period that followed was very interesting. Topics included the aforementioned changing the name of the DPC class, a spontaneous kick-off for a building maintenance fundraiser for the new AACA headquarters, strong interest in increasing younger generation membership numbers, questions/comments about existing tours and other events, plus, of course, at-length discussion about taking the convention out of Philadelphia. In general, the tone was positive and respectful, and it was clear the AACA staff, President and Board were genuinely interested.

For those of you who were in attendance, I hope you agree my observations and takeaways are on point. For those of you who did not attend, or perhaps never attended the annual convention, attending the 2023 convention may be something worth considering. In my opinion, it's time well spent. Not just for the seminars and events, but, perhaps just as important, enjoying the fellowship and camaraderie of the AACA membership.

### **Food Valley and Motor Valley - Emilia-Romagna**

Emilia-Romagna, the Land of Motors and the Riders, a motor valley, a haven for racing and auto enthusiast, car and motorcycle manufacturers, racing tracks, museums and collections in one place. From the famous racetracks of Imola and Misano to the factories of famous race car and motorbike brands, such as Ferrari, Lamborghini, Pagani, Maserati, Dallara and Ducati to the museums and collections. Endless legends like Ayrton Senna and the Imola Circuit behind the story are around. Racing is in the DNA of this area. You can feel a sporting passion because of numerous events like Motor Fest, 1000 Miglia and various racing events(MotoGP, Formula 1..).

Emilia-Romagna is not only well-known for its motor industry. It is also full of food and cultural events.

Do you know any place in the world that has the most food that are PDO(Protected Designation of Origin) and PGI(Protected Geographical Indication) certifications as a seal of their quality and authenticity?

Emilia-Romagna in Italy is called the Food Valley since it is the home of Parma ham, traditional balsamic vinegar, Culatello salami, Parmigiano Reggiano, Ragù sauce, tagliatelle, tortellini

pasta, Sangiovese, Lambrusco, Albana, Pignoletto and the ultimate Italian Gelato experience at Carpigiani Gelato university...

Emilia-Romagna in Italy is called the Food Valley because its world-known culinary traditions, which range from the best restaurant in the world like two time top 5 at The World's 50 Best Restaurants Awards winner Massimo Bottura's restaurant, street food like piadina. You can experience the culinary food in the all forms. The home town (Forlimpopoli) of Pellegrino Artusi (acknowledged father of Italian cookery), author of the famous 'Science in the Kitchen and the Art of Eating Well' cookbook is in this region. The accolades of the region for food include Parma its designation as a UNESCO Creative City of Gastronomy. Parma was appointed a seat on the European Food Safety Authority.

Emilia-Romagna in Italy represents some of the best of Italy's culture with contributions from music greats like Verdi, Toscanini, Luciano Pavarotti, Leo Nucci and Mirella Fren who have changed the history of the opera musical genre.

If you are into the culture, Forlie ("Duce's city") has some of Italy's culturally and artistically significant landmarks. Benito Mussolini was born in Forlie. Ravenna was the capital city of the Western Roman Empire and was formed as the center of the eastern Roman Empire (Byzantine Empire). It is known for its well-preserved late Roman and Byzantine architecture. Lord Byron, Oscar Wilde, T. S. Eliot... and Dante inspired by the surroundings in Ravenna and left the world with bountiful literature.
